Dear Friends,

Thank you for taking the time to review our report. You will see as you read through these pages we are blessed with innovative programs and dedicated staff members. It is a joy to see the interaction between such a dedicated group of adults inspiring, educating, challenging, and yes, even correcting our youth. To the average on looker, assisting 68 teenagers in five locations can seem like a three ring circus with so much activity going on. But, it is however, more like an intricate machine with countless moving parts. Each part is as essential as the next.

The youth come to us with a myriad of needs. Our trained professional staff assists the youngsters and their families in developing highly specific and individualized treatment plans that will meet their needs and reunite them with their families as soon as possible. When the youth cannot be reunited with family, an alternative is developed, such as a loving foster home. All of the activities that you will read about in this year's report are just some of the program offerings that we've developed in order to help the residents meet their individualized treatment objectives in an environment that is structured, safe, fun and as much like a home as we can possibly be.

You may have noticed a new look to the front of the Annual Report. For quite some time, we have been toying around with the idea of changing our look to better encompass our vision and mission. For 95 years, Davis Stuart has been a place of refuge for so many of West Virginia's youth.

There are many misconceptions about the children who come to Davis Stuart. One of the biggest errors in thinking is that the teens who walk through our doors come to us because they are criminals. While most of us know this is far from the truth, it is our desire to better vocalize that often, we're simply helping teens who need additional guidance and repairing the family unit. When needed, if family reunification is not feasible, Davis Stuart works to find that child a loving foster home or prepare them to enter into independence.

Davis Stuart has been able to provide services for West Virginia's children and their families because of the foundation of the Presbyterian Church in 1919. To this day, we still hold our Presbyterian heritage close to our hearts; having entered into a covenant relationship with the Presbytery of West Virginia. The royal blue and gold color scheme was no accident as we wanted to capture the same color scheme of our Presbyterian brothers and sisters. If you'll look at the foot of the logo you'll notice what appears to be an open book. This symbol signifies the Word of God. Everything that we do at Davis Stuart, we're always rooted by His word.

We hope you like our new logo and feel that it captures a feeling of promise, hope and, growth.

I am pleased that such a specialized treatment takes place in an environment that is open and inviting. It is not uncommon for us to see a licensed therapist taking a walk with a youngster on the Satterfield Activity Field, or the Spiritual Life Director taking a group kayaking. Group Homes

In addition to Davis Stuart's main campus in Lewisburg, we provide services in the form of four group homes located in Beckley, Bluefield, Maxwelton, and Princeton. Each of these homes has the capacity to serve six teens with Bluefield and Maxwelton serving girls and Beckley and Princeton serving boys. Each set of houseparents bring different but very important strengths to the homes in which they serve. The main objective for the houseparents is to make the teens' time spent at the group homes as close to a regular adolescent life as possible. Director of Group Homes, Lindsey Fleming is thrilled with the dedication of the

current staff. In the Beckley home, Frank and Monna Rush have a multitude of experience working with older teens in regards to Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASC), college, and community employment. Connie Hamilton is new to the Bluefield group home but brings specialized expertise. Connie has years of experience working with at-risk youth in North Carolina and is committed to providing impeccable quality care. Maxwelton is welcoming our newest houseparents, Nate and Colette Workman. Nate and Colette are incredibly dedicated and are already willing to go above and beyond. Several individuals serve the Princeton group home where staff and teens are committed to working and giving back to their community.

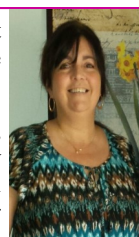

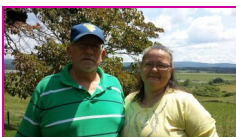

Education at Davis Stuart

One of the things about traditional public schooling is its fall start and spring end, with the summers off. At Davis Stuart School, both teachers and students are in school year-round, giving students a chance to maintain their learning, as well as make up credits they've failed before they were placed here. The good

thing is that with our small classes, students get the assistance they need to bring their grades up and earn enough credits to get back on track with graduation. Our goal is to send them back to school with a greatly improved transcript. This year, four students completed the Option Pathway Program and earned diplomas from their home high schools and four other students passed their TASC (Test Assessing Secondary Completion - comparable to the GED) while in placement.

While we are very proud of the number of credits our students earn each semester, we are also delighted this year to have been able to take students off campus for a number of events. Our history classes take a field trip each year and to earn money, they have a booth at Taste of Our Towns (TOOT) in downtown Lewisburg. Our booth had long lines during the festival, as the Italian sau-

sages with peppers and onions

were quite popular. Students working the booth remarked that they had never worked so hard! This event funded a trip to Cass Scenic Railroad in October.

In the spring, we took students to Cranberry Glades where they enjoyed a presentation on snakes and toured the Glades. Students loved the Three Rivers Avian Center and its efforts to rehabilitate injured raptors and release them back into the wild. During the summer session, four of our students had the fantastic opportunity of taking culinary classes at Fruits of Our Labor in Rainelle, working with an executive chef for four days.

While the school program is all about graduating from high school, we do take time to have fun. You only need to check out our videos on YouTube by searching for Rock Camp Studios to see kids having fun being kids. Our latest work is The Best Day of My Life.

We hope you enjoy it.

Richard Byrd

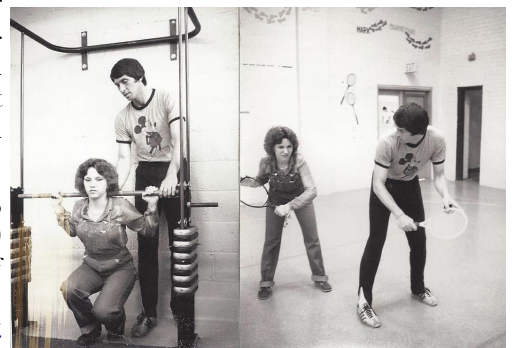

EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT

EMPLOYMENT PREPARATION PROGRAM

When Davis Stuart was originally founded, it was designed to provide an environment in which children could learn values, habits, manners, and some vocational skills. In keeping with this founding philosophy, Davis Stuart continues to provide a safe, loving home-like environment for children so that they may develop the values and skills to be productive, healthy citizens. Ninety-five years later, job and vocational training remains a vital element and operates as the Employment Preparation Program, which has become an essential component within the overall treatment program.



Through the Employment Preparation Program, residents are taught responsibility and the importance of developing their skills, maintaining honesty, following directives, and money management. Residents are paid an hourly wage by Davis Stuart for the work performed. Jobs include painting, cleaning, grounds maintenance, carpentry, oversight of the greenhouse project, distribution of goods from centralized purchasing to the cottages, and so much more. In addition, Davis Stuart has enjoyed good working relationships with local businesses such as The Bakery, Kroger,

Lit'l Rascals Day Care, Colonial Ford, and Susan's World of Pets. Once a month, the teens head to Old Stone Presbyterian Church to help prepare bags of groceries for local families in need.

Upon receipt of their paycheck, they deposit a percentage of it into a savings account opened in their name. By this avenue a resident can save for special purchases they want to make. When leaving Davis Stuart, the remaining balance of their savings is withdrawn and a check of the amount is made payable to the resident. For many, this is the first time the resident has had the opportunity to develop vocational skills and experience the pride of a well-earned paycheck.

To keep this wonderful program going, Davis Stuart must rely solely on the benevolence of our investors, primarily comprised of members of the Presbyterian Church USA, citizens of the local community, and foundations.



Greenhouse

In the past years, there has been an increased interest among residents for agricultural and culinary related job opportunities. As our program reflects the current needs of our residents, the Employment Preparation Program at Davis Stuart adapted its summer program to include oversight of the greenhouse and vegetable garden. Kids enjoy not only tending and growing their gardens, but preparing the fresh produce in their culinary arts class as well. A café was opened to staff on designated days where the residents prepare and serve their culinary creations. In recent years; with vision from staff member Howard Ogden and support from a local foundation, the greenhouse has been spruced up and the growing season extended through the winter months. As one would expect, a year-round program has greatly increased the residents' opportunities to learn skills in both the agricultural and food industries.



Spiritual Life

The Spiritual Life Program has enjoyed an incredible season of growth and development this year at Davis Stuart. We have been blessed with increases in mid-week chapel attendance, Sunday chapel attendance with family members, and Spiritual Life group participation. I could not be prouder of our young people's involvement this year.

In the summer of 2013, this vision started becoming a reality. With the help of the local Lewisburg Lowes and The Boy Scouts of America, Davis Stuart was able to make significant progress on the amphitheater, however, much more still needed to be accomplished. With a grant reward from First Presbyterian Church of South Charleston, Davis Stuart was able to bring this project to fruition. In May, Davis Stuart unveiled the

GESUNDHEIT!

On a hot, sunny day in June, the residents and staff at Davis Stuart received some very unusual visitors. Pouring out of a large, pink, polka dot van arrived over 30 clowns from the Gesundheit! Institute in Hillsboro, WV. Quickly, the clowns broke out into groups and submersed themselves in the classrooms and cottages at Davis Stuart. At first, the teens weren't quite sure what the unexpected visitors were up to but quickly, everyone became fast friends. One group of clowns took over classroom instruction, another group performed skits at Davis Stuart's newly constructed amphitheater, and some clowns danced and sang with the teens. After lunch, everyone headed to Davis Stuart's pool area for volleyball, soccer



and impromptu musical stylings.

Members of the Institute come together from countries like Mexico, Spain, Italy, The United Kingdom and The United States to learn to heal through laughter and joy. The Gesundheit! Institute is a nonprofit organization and the creation of Patch Adams. In 1998, Patch Adams became a household name from the portrayal done by the late actor, Robin Williams in the movie, 'Patch Adams'. Adams founded the Gesundheit! Institute in 1971 to create a new, holistic health care model that would integrate laughter, joy and creativity.



Experiences such as these are incredibly valuable to the teens who call Davis Stuart home.

According to State of Obesity, 18.5% of West Virginia youth; ages 10-17, are obese. Overweight and obese children are at a severe disadvantage both from immediate health effects and long-term health effects. Overweight and obese youth are more likely to have risk factors for cardiovascular disease, such as high

cholesterol or high blood pressure. Furthermore, they are more likely to develop pre-diabetes, are at greater risk for bone and joint problems, and sleep apnea. Youth who are overweight or obese are likely to be obese adults and are more at risk for adult health problems. In addition to the physical health concerns, overweight and obese children have a lower quality of life pertaining to their emotional, educational and social well-being. Currently, West Virginia is the most obese state for adults and is the 15th most obese state for children. Because of these alarming statistics, Davis Stuart is committed to

providing a healthy, balanced diet for the residents, and therefore is embarking on building a centralized dining facility.

Davis Stuart receives bundled funding through the state for room and board, as well as treatment and Medicaid services. However, state and federal dollars cannot be used to reimburse the cost of the construction of the dining hall. Davis Stuart must rely solely upon private funds to get this important and worthwhile project off the ground.

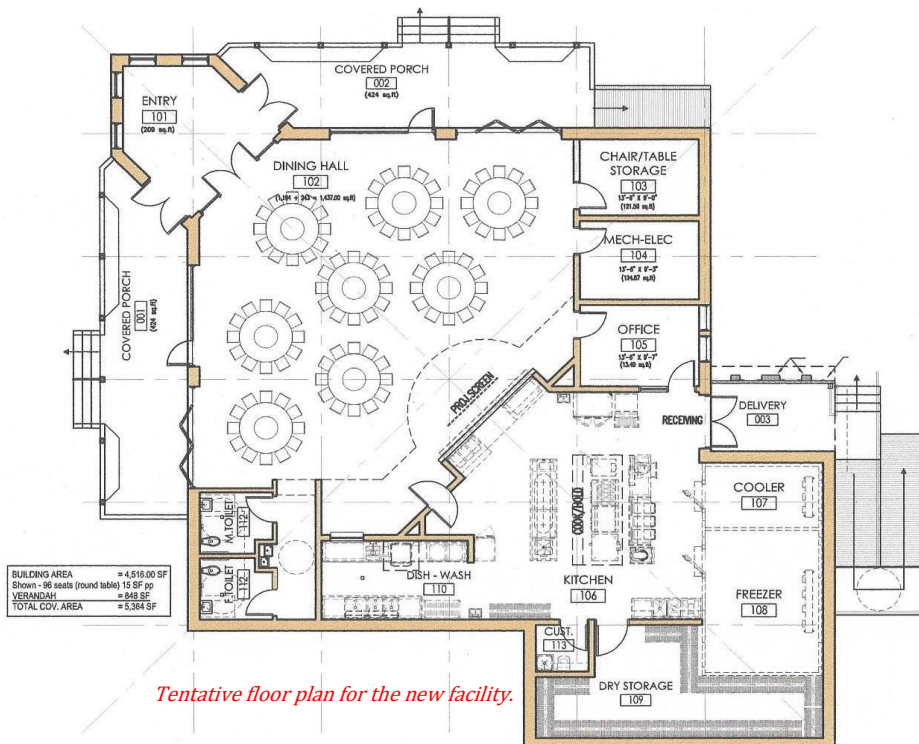
The new dining hall will seat 100 people, will cover 5,364 square feet, and be multi-functional. Family-style dining will still be emphasized but the dining hall will also have the capabilities to serve cafeteria style when needed for large groups. The dining hall will also be used for group meetings, movie

nights, and other large events. A projector screen will be installed to accommodate such occasions. Glass Nana-wall doors on two sides of the dining hall will allow for open-air dining.

The kitchen is going to have a central work area in order to teach food prep to the residents. Hopefully, we can incorporate an outside grill for delicious meals in warmer months. To accommodate Davis Stuart's home-grown beef, the kitchen will also feature a large walk-in freezer. Two covered porches will accompany the new facility so teens can enjoy the beautiful views the campus has to offer.

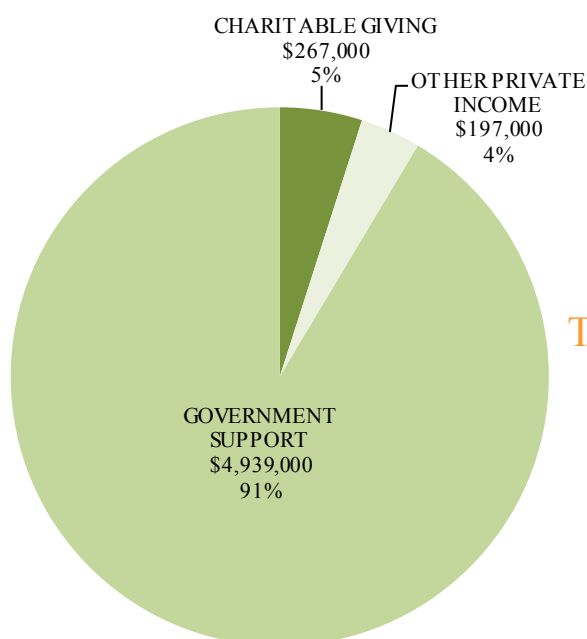

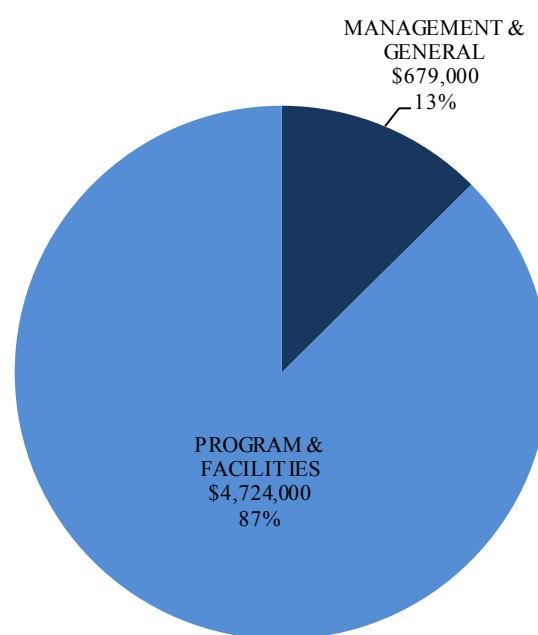
REVENUE & EXPENDITURES
