When working in child care, there are some success stories that write themselves. Kachina is a young lady that came to Davis Stuart two years ago. Everyone at Davis Stuart has fallen in love with her precocious nature, gentle spirit, and warm heart.

During her time at Davis Stuart she has immersed herself in almost everything the organization has to offer, "Davis Stuart has provided everything that I needed while I've been here, especially spiritual life and equine therapy. I've learned a lot from those programs.", says Kachina. She became involved with the Spiritual Life Program when she arrived because she was curious about God. She says that spiritual life helped her to realize her own relationship with God. The Spiritual Life Program provided opportunities for Kachina to learn to play guitar, sing in choir, and participate in the annual Christmas programs.

As soon as Kachina arrived at Davis Stuart, she immediately took to the horses, and they took to her, as well. Kachina has a special relationship with each horse at our main campus. She describes the Equine Assisted Therapy Program as relaxing and therapeutic. She says,

"If you're stressed out or sad, everything melts away when you're with the horses, it's like your troubles and worries don't exist." Through her participation in the equine assisted program, Kachina has competed in horse shows at The State Fair of West Virginia and Davis Stuart's First Annual Horse Show, receiving ribbons and accolades.



Arriving at Davis Stuart two years ago, Kachina barely tested into the 9th grade. She had never sat in a classroom with peers and received instruction. In just 20 months, she was caught up academically and ready to graduate on time! An accomplishment that fills her with pride, "I always had one-on-one attention and they (the teachers) were always there to push and take me as far as I could go." Through her exemplary accomplishments she was able to become involved with the Culinary Arts Program. Through her work with the program, she, along with four other students, were selected to work with Tammy Jordan, owner of Fruits of Labor, a local food service and educational organization. Kachina participated in the Youth Addiction Prevention Program through the business, Seeds of Hope. Kachina did such an outstanding job that Tammy asked her to come back and continue working in the program. During Kachina's time with Fruits of Labor, she continues to balance all of her responsibilities, receiving her high school diploma, continuing guitar lessons,

assisting with the equine assisted program, and working with her peers in our culinary program. She is working on obtaining her associates degree in the culinary arts field and has already taken two agricultural classes through New River Community and Technical College. Her next goal is to certify as a culinarian through the American Culinary Federation (ACF). On the days she works with Fruits of Labor, Kachina arrives at 7a.m. to begin baking and getting ready for the day. Tammy says that Kachina is learning the baking and pastry component of the culinary field, refining her skills making breads, pie crusts, desserts, and cookies. On their busy days,

Kachina prepares 77 dozen cookies! In the afternoon, Kachina shifts to the chef's side where she works on her knife skill-set by prepping and sautéing for the lunch crowd. Tammy's goal is to make sure that Kachina is cross trained between baking and culinary so that she is fully prepared to take the ACF exam. Tammy adds, "Kachina is a remarkable young lady, and she is highly motivated and driven. She is a light and joy. We're very blessed to get to work with her. She makes me happy."

In order for Kachina to excel, Davis Stuart has provided her with a vehicle, cell phone, and laptop. But, as Lindsey Fleming, Assistant Director of Group Homes, states, Kachina's success is her own. "Kachina doesn't play with the cards she was dealt. She chose to take things into her own hands. We were there to provide support, is offered to her or the freedoms given."

zano Institute out of Colorado and required us to deeply examine our teaching practices. In the following days, we followed up with Dr. Tina Boogren of the Marzano Institute, in her recent correspondence she noted, <u>"Your</u> emphasis on building relationships and making connections

with all students is apparent, important, and appreciated. The impact you have on your students is long-lasting whether you ever see that impact with your own eves or not; you have to trust that you are.".

This statement, from an outsider looking closely into our classrooms on a regular school day, means a lot to us, because deep down, it is our highest aspiration. We know that the relationship with our students is what allows us to reach them academically.

The 2015-16 school year seems like a whirlwind now that it is complete. Many highlights made memories for the teachers and the students. Those memories began in the classrooms as we continued our Career and Technical Educational Program in the culinary arts. Additional-

ly, we added agricultural education to make use of Davis Stuart's vast landscape. In September, representatives from NASA came to our school to teach the students how to build and program a Vex Robot for a competition. Since Davis Stuart was the pilot program, a videographer was on hand all week to film the project.

In October, we participated in Taste of Our Towns (T.O.O.T.) in Lewisburg and earned the money to take students to the Frontier Museum in Staunton, VA, to learn about the different types of early civilizations that affected the American expansion. We also hosted the quarterly institutional principal's meeting on campus. Our students had a chance to show off their culinary skills as they catered the event. The students also shared their programming skills, as they demonstrated the antics of the robots they had constructed.

In February, three culinary students were part of a team competing at the Junior Cast-Iron Cook-off at the Marriott

Hotel in Charleston. They came away with third place, beating out several large, long-standing culinary programs, and tied with Pocahontas County for Best Teamwork.

In the meantime, 12 students passed their TASC

(high school equivalency) and seven of them earned high school diplomas from their home schools as a result of completing vocational programs at the same time.

At the end of May, most of the students on campus and many of the Davis Stuart staff, rocked to Justin Timberlake's "Can't Stop the Feeling" and filmed the annual spring video.

It was great fun for everyone involved and had more videographers working on it as teachers used new technology provided by West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE). In fact, Davis Stuart School got all new computers and technology over the summer.

As I look back, I see what I already knew, that our culinary program not only opens doors for students, it has helped the campus become a much sought after meeting location because the amenities (i.e. food) are so good. The great news is that the program will get a \$200,000 shot in the arm as we break ground on a new state-of-theart restaurant-quality kitchen for culinary students, courtesy of a grant from WVDE. Great foods and great experiences for our students will definitely lead the way for the new school year.



All of our staff and children are safe, although some staff lost all they had. Some staff continued to work in the cottages taking care of kids, knowing their home may be flooded.

It is a lesson we work very hard to instill in our youngsters, the popular saying among Presbyterians, "We Serve Because We Can", is appropriate in this time. Our young people would amaze you. They have asked to be part of the volunteer efforts in the Greenbrier Valley and surrounding areas. A group of our boys and staff volunteered with St. James Episcopal Church in Lewisburg. They helped collect and organize donations as well as cleaning damaged properties.

Therapy and Healing

Davis Stuart is committed to providing teens and families with the therapy and tools needed to have successful relationships and healthy lives. In our therapy department, there are many spokes of the wheel, all implemented to increase

long-term effectiveness, ensuring teens and families will thrive years after they've come to us. Therapy at Davis Stuart begins with creating goals and objectives for each child's treatment plan. We work extensively with families in preparation for the child to arrive home. In instances where family reunification is not feasible, we work to provide residents with other permanency options. If a youth is quickly approaching adulthood, we assist with that transition, as well. Treatment includes individual therapy, group therapy, and family therapy. Davis Stuart also partners with Rainelle Medical Center to provide a group called, Healthy Relationships that addresses sexuality and other issues.

Communication is key in the therapeutic process. Whether that's communicating with families, other staff, or social workers, the Permanency Coordinators at Davis Stuart are the hub. While we are all advocates, the Permanency Coordinators have a deep understanding of the emotional, physical, and medical needs presented in each child. This includes collaboration with our nursing staff and psychiatrist. The Permanency Coordinators must also keep close contact with the educational staff, both on our main campus and at the public schools. To ensure all of our staff are equipped with the necessary tools to provide a nurturing and healing environment, Board Certified Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) Clinician, Buddy Dunkley (featured in the Employee Spotlight) provides training for staff on family dynamics and psychiatric emergencies.

Everything from the beauty and tranquility of our campus, to clinical interventions, Davis Stuart is a therapeutic milieu that provides the utmost quality in care. Programs such as, employment preparation and recreation are included in a child's treatment objectives. Employment Preparation Program is therapeutic in that it provides teens with the skill set needed to become employable adults and gives them exposure and experience interacting with their peers, members of staff, and those in the community. Voluntary programs such as spiritual life and equine assisted therapy are also included in a resident's treatment plan, permitting they're interested in the program. Equine Assisted Therapy Program is incredibly beneficial, unfortunately, many don't understand its value. The program is a great equalizer and has a very calm-

ing effect and helps to establish reality for many residents. It gives teens the tools needed to overcome obstacles, problem solve situations, and teaches them to think of others. These skills aid residents in being successful once they are discharged to home. In fact, according to Clinical Director, Stewart Anderson, M.A., L.P.C., equine assisted therapy is the first recommendation for treatment of mood disorders. We encourage students to participate in all groups in order to give them exposure to new and exciting things. Davis Stuart is striving to maintain this very valuable service through private funding as it currently is not represented in Medicaid codes.

EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT

In order to provide the utmost quality care for our children, we must employ exceptional staff. In January 2016, Davis Stuart Therapist, Buddy Dunkley, became Board Certified as a Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) Clinician through the American Psychotherapy Association.

In 2008, Buddy earned his bachelor degree in Psychology and Political Science, In 2011 he received his master's degree in Mental Health Counseling. Mr. Dunkley joined Davis Stuart as a therapist in 2013. In addition to his degrees, Buddy is a licensed Professional Counselor in West Virginia and North Carolina. Becoming a Board Certified PTSD Clinician marks his membership with the American Psychotherapy Association. He is also a member of the American Counseling Association, American Mental Health Counseling Association, and WV Counseling Association.

Buddy says, "Davis Stuart has different features other programs lack, such as equine therapy, employment preparation, and culinary arts. We work to get teens back to their families and communities, and not prolong their stay. If family reunification is not feasible, we work diligently to stabilize these individuals to enter to independence." Buddy enjoys working with troubled teenagers and the flexibility of using different styles of therapy. He also likes to know that he has helped to make a difference in their lives.

Glenn Kaiser




