Education at Davis-Stuart

"It might seem crazy what I'm about to say", but I believe this past school year was epitomized by the video we produced the last week of school. The lyrics to Pharrell Williams' song, *Happy*, provides a backdrop for a tough year which brought tremendous growth for the on-

grounds school here at Davis-Stuart.

Big changes and improvements came about as Davis-Stuart School became a Title I school. This meant we would receive federal monies dedicated to instructional improvements and this, our first year, meant an influx of technology commensurate with the best public schools in the state. As of today, we have a ratio of better than one computer for every student. We also have



Smart Boards in every classroom, an amazing tool for 21st Century learners (think of a giant iPad and you've got it.) These monies also meant that this summer, we had a reading specialist on

board to address those students who came in with abysmal reading scores.

Having the Culinary Arts Program move to full time has been a terrific benefit all around. Not only does it allow more students to learn these skills, it made it possible for our school to be an Option Pathway School, a designation that allows students to pass the high school equivalency test (now called TASC) and get a diploma from their high school. In May, we had our first graduate in this program.



Finally, with the video hitting YouTube, we did the near impossible. As Williams says, "aint nuthin' gonna get me down" and just working through the initial brainstorming with the students to the finished product brought everyone on board. The Year at a Glance...



Relationships hold the key to an individual's success or failure. Equine Therapy uses the horse as mirror or metaphor for how an individual relates to others. Children at Davis-Stuart who participate in the Equine Therapy Program learn to evaluate their own behavior and to try new ways of being and doing in order to be successful. Through activities with the horse, individuals will learn skills that will help them to become more successful in their relationships, and therefore, life itself.

Licensed therapist, Carol Lewis leads our Equine Therapy Program; where teens are taught proper feeding, grooming, horse handling techniques, and

learn to identify the basic parts of the horse. Teens also learn the history of the horse, and how to perform specific maneuvers. As the program develops with each child and reliable horses are available, teens learn basic horseback riding skills, as well.

Equine Therapy at Davis-Stuart has slowly found its footing. Starting off in 2000 with only two horses, we are now equipped with a horse barn, 7 horses and more recently, 3 miniature horses. Some of our teens even showcased their horsemanship talents at the State Fair of West Virginia. Lewis says the equine program started off "as just a dream" and to see the advancements and strides it's made over the years is truly remarkable.

Davis-Stuart is always looking for new and exciting opportunities for our kids. We were presented with such an opportunity upon meeting Janine Lazarus with Goodladd Dog Training.

Lazarus hails from London, England and has an extensive background working with animals. For six years she worked at the New Skete Monastery, initially in the training kennels and finally as Brother Christopher's Head Trainer and Program Director. She is the first female dog trainer to work with the Brothers and is featured and credited in the latest revised version of their book, "The Art of Raising a Puppy".

SPOTLIGHT ON NURSING



Julie Byrd-Director of Nursing RN, Lisa Butler- Medical Records Technician, Debra Ballard-RN, and Tabatha Martin-LPN

Director of Nursing, Julie Byrd can remember when the Nursing Department consisted of Julie volunteering her time and knowledge whenever there was a question or concern about the health of one of the teens. Today, Davis-Stuart's Nursing Department is one that is efficient and larger than anyone would have imagined 25 years ago.

In December 1991, Julie transitioned from volunteering her time as a Nurse Consultant to becoming the one and only person in the new Nursing Department. Now, Davis-Stuart employs 3 nurses, Debra Ballard-RN, Tabatha Martin-LPN, and a Medical Records Technician, Lisa Butler. There is always a nurse on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

When a new child comes to Davis-Stuart they first go through a Nurses Assessment where the nurses will ask about the child's medical history and what they need. Often, the teens come with a lot of health issues that have never been addressed and this is the first step to bringing a child back to wellness. Julie says, *"Sometimes, our teenagers come to us looking disheveled and ill; after a few weeks the transformation is amazing. They look like a different person after good nutrition, sleep, cleanliness, safety, and medical care."*

In addition to our stellar nursing team, Dr. Jewell of Seneca Health Services comes twice a month for psychiatric services and staff from the Robert C. Byrd clinic comes once a week to address additional health issues. In a matter of 2 decades, Davis-Stuart has gone from having 1 nurse to having an entire medical clinic on campus!

They say it takes a village to raise a child, and our Nursing Department is a foundation of our village.
